Math Science Center Bids To Be Received Until June 1

Bids will be received June 1 for construction of a \$1.1 million, four-story mathematical science center at the University, Dale O. Bowling, University business manager, said today.

Bids are to be submitted at the office of the director of construction, Room 6, of the University General Services Building until 10 a.m. (CDT) June 1.

The brick, limestone and glass structure, to be erected on what was formerly Rollins

Field, between the University swimming pool and the mall on the south side of Rollins Street, will be paid for by appropriations granted by the General Assembly in 1965 and supplemented by a federal grant.

Designed primarily as an office building, the center will house the departments of mathematics, mathematical science, statistics and the computer center. It will contain faculty and graduate student offices as well as a library.

The air-conditioned building will be constructed to allow for future expansion to the south. It is designed by architects Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum Inc., St. Louis. Their most recent work here has been the dormitory complexes at College Avenue and Rollins Street.

The building will be of modern design, with most of the ground floor exterior glass wall recessed to provide an overhang of the upper two floors. Five pillars on each side of the 100-foot square building will help support the upper floors.

Band to Give Choral Concert

Thieves stole \$1,853.00 in cash and merchandise over the week end in three stores in Sturgeon and Rocheport.

Bill Calvert, of the Sturgeon Lumber Co., reported stolen 13 guns, total value of \$468.75, a \$44 Weaver Scope, a \$41.65 pair of binoculars, and \$50 worth of ammunition. A roll of pennies and \$2 in nickels were taken from the cash register but nothing from the safe, which was pried open, or two desks which were ransacked.

Truman Ritchie, of Ritchie's Hardware, Sturgeon, reported yesterday an estimated \$1,160.20 in cash and merchandise was taken from his store. Missing were eight television sets, a stereo record player, four transistor radios, a gun, and \$225 taken from the safe. Some checks taken from the safe and a television tube caddy were found across the street in an alley.

Thieves stole Sunday night an estimated \$85.90 from the Country Store, Rocheport. Sheriff deputies investigated the complaint made by Al Gibson and found missing some coonskin caps, four country hams, six packages of bacon, a silver dollar and a collection of old coins.

Sheriff deputies believe the Sturgeon robberies, probably occurring Sunday night, were connected since it looked as if the merchandise stolen from the hardware store was taken to the lumber company for loading. Also entrance to both places was gained by using one or two five-eighths inch bars.

Mud prints were found in the Country Store but no fingerprints were discovered at any of the three sites.
